In an ideal world, a guest bedroom would be just that, but in reality most do double duty as an overflow storage space, laundry room, playroom... The list goes on. If you have people coming to stay, clear out clutter where possible, and take inspiration from the following examples to make this holiday season one that your guests will remember for all the right reasons.



THE COUNTRY-HOUSE-HOTEL LOOK

'Make the bed and bedding as luxurious as your budget will allow,' advises interior designer Davina Stanley (paperandwhite.com), who decorated this spare room. 'A cashmere throw is a good touch, and I also like to include a tray loaded with a scented candle, some carefully chosen books, a note with the Wi-Fi code and a vase of flowers.'



Leave a tray with a coloured-glass water jug and tumblers on the bedside or dressing table. Hint carafe, £32, and tumblers, £24 for two, LSA (Isa-international.com)



A patterned quilt will add warmth and wow factor, plus a dose of cheerful colour. Cotton block-printed quilt, from £195 for a double, The Mews (themewsfurnishings.com)

THE HARD-WORKING SPACE

When the spare room doubles as a home office, a good sofa bed is invaluable. This one from Ligne Roset (from £1,947, ligne-roset. com) is a smart, low-profile sofa by day, while at night it unfolds easily into a comfortable bed – and thanks to its armless design, your guests won't feel as though they're sleeping on the sofa.



Hang a spare dressing gown on the back of the door to make visitors feel at home. Linen robe, \$80, Piglet (pigletinbed.com)




A compact side table with a drawer is useful for holding a hairdryer and toiletries. Oak No.185 bedside table, £199, John Lewis (johnlewis.com)

ONE FOR THE KIDS

Dress up a children's room, as interior designers K&H Design (kandhdesign.co.uk) have done here, with a Christmas banner, a pop-up decoration on the table and a little present on each bed. Keep an extra stocking handy for any small guests who might have forgotten theirs.

THE HOME FROM HOME

It's the little thoughtful details that elevate a spare room: here, there's a foldable luggage rack for guests to put their bags on, a ladder for hanging towels and a good-sized bedside table each side of the bed (all from gardentrading.co.uk). Bud vases with flowers are the finishing touch.
